Wednesday 11 October from 6.30pm

'**Our Scotland: A Japanese perspective**' (2013, 34 mins): A ceilidh held in Glasgow is highlighted as showing 'inclusive' aspects of Scottish society, where there is a role for strangers to play. What does it mean to share other cultures?

Wednesday 29 November from 6.30pm

'**Our friends in Fukushima**' (2013, 40 mins): This is the first of JDS's five documentaries on Fukushima, following Fukushima University scientists's efforts to minimise the nuclear accident's damage on the environment.

Wednesday 20 December from 6.30pm

'**The bird, the tree, the bell and the fish of Glasgow**' (2014, 33 mins): The enigmatic phrase of Glasgow's coat of arms is interpreted, in various ways, by Christians, a Taichi teacher, an Indian resident, and bell ringers. What an 'inclusive' phrase!

This is co-organised by Kelvin Hall and Japan Desk Scotland, with financial support from the Great Britain Sasakawa Foundation. It is also funded by BEMIS Scotland via the 2017 Year of History, Heritage and Archaeology, a partnership between BEMIS Scotland and the Scottish Government to facilitate diverse, multicultural celebration.
